SOCIOLOGY

The central theme of "Social Life and Personality", the phase of Socialogy studied by the Sophomore class. is the effect of social life upon personality. This subject has been most fascinating to the pupils. Seven phases of social life have been studied - the family, the community, education, play, work, art, and religion. After the study of each unit, an interesting discussion of a case study twas engaged in by the pupils. Sometimes a debate resulted from the discussions. The pupils showed in their class discussions that they had been led to become aware that they are members of society and that as members they have the responsibility of helping society solve its problems, intelligently.

GOVERNMENT

Beginning the second semester the Sophomore class began the study of American Government which emphasizes governmental approaches to peace with justice, security, and abundance. The pupils have seen that, an "No government can rise higher than its source. In a democracy that source is the people themselves. The future of democracy rests with the people. If the people take an interest in government, make a study of it, and work at it, democracy will be preserved and perfected." Hence, the class has enthusiastically studied national, state, and local government. A reasonable amount of each class period has also been devoted to the discussion of political news.

THE LINCOLN HIGH SCHOOL CHORUS

INDUSTRIAL ARTS

One of the new departments established at Lincoln High School this year has been the work in Industrial Arts. This course has been organized on the General Shop plan with units of work in Drawing, Cement, Woodwork, etc. The boys have shown much interest in the work and have turned out some splendid projects for beginners. Some of the projects made by the boys this year were footstools, corner shelves, letter files, waste baskets, bookends, magazine baskets, record cabinets, end tables, etc.

In the course, provision is made for experiences calculated to develop desirable habits and attitudes, such as self-reliance, industry, initiative, self-confidence, cooperation, etc, as well as tool skills, and a knowledge of the methods of procedure and the working qualities and characteristics of some of our most used materials.

At present, the equipment in the shop consists of only a few hand tools. Both equipment and materials have been scarce and very difficult to obtain this year.

The shop organization has been set up on a rotating fashion with the boys serving in various capacities from week to week. Each week there is a change /in duties so that every boy serves in each capacity at some time.

It is hoped that we will be able to obtain additional equipment and materials for the next school term.

The Principal, Mr. H. L. Drew, is the Industrial Arts instructor.

MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT

The Freshman and Sophomore classes have studied first year Algebra this year. The two classes were combined with a total enrollment of thirty-one at the beginning of the school year.

The instructor has kept in mind that algebra is one of a series of high school mathematics which has been designed to stress the usefulness or purposefulness of mathematics. The major aim of the course has been the understanding of the principles and concepts. The major objective in teaching algebra has been to help the pupils develop the power to reason, to analyze, and to think clearly and logically. The practical value of algebra has been constantly kept before the pupils and an attempt has been made to develop correct methods of study.

Plane Geometry is the branch of mathematics studied by the Junior class this ycar. Th the first lessons of the course the class learned "why we study geometry", hence, geometry, like algrebra, has been meaningful to the pupils. Many applications of the use of geometry have been made. The pupils have a greater appreciation of geometric designs, have studied their various uses, and have made practical application of them.

Mrs. Mary Ella Tymony is the Instructor of the courses in Mathematics.

THE SPEECH CLASS

The Lincoln High School Speech class is composed of a large number of pupils. Miss Helen Carter of the English department is the teacher of this class.

It is an English organization attempting to give its members not only an appreciation and understanding of speech, but also training in acting and oral expression.

This is the first year we have had Speech offered for credit, but the pupils are progressing greatly in their public speaking and are gradually overcoming their stage fright.

This is the first time in recent years that Lincoln has had a girls' basketball team. At the request of the Principal the teach wwas organized at the beginning of the school term with Mrs. L. V. Richardson as Coach. Rose Mary Miller was elected team Captain.

During the regular season the team played eight games, winning three and losing five. One of their victories was over the strong C.C. Hubbard high girls from Sedalia, Mo.

The girls also participated in the Girls' basketball Tournament held at our school on March 16, 1946. They won third place. For this they received a nice trophy which has been placed in the school's Trophy Case as evidence of their arhietic skill. Three of Lincoln's girls were chosen on the All-Tourney teams- they were Rose Mary Miller, Adlene Graves, and Mayme L. Evans.

In the Free-throw contest held the same and day the Lincoln girls won second place.

The girls are looking forward to a much better season next year. According to the statement made recently by the Principal, plans will be started early next year for purchasing new basketball uniforms for the girls' team.



The 1945-46 basketball season found the Lincoln Tigers with few feterans left for the team. So the squad this year has been a new and inexperienced one. Our school became a charter member of the newly organized Central Missouri Athletic Conference. Our Principal, Mr. H. L. Drew, is the Secretary-Treasurer of that body and was largely responsible for the organization of the Conference. It was his idea. The members of the Conference were high schools from Dalton, Columbka, Sedalia, Hannibal, Mexico, Moberly, Boonville, and Jefferson City, Mo.

During the year our athletic teams participated in four basketball tourneys, three Track and Field Meets, and played a full basketball schedule. We won five points in the State Meet in Jefferson City. Harold Carter tied for first place in the high jump, height 5' 7"- The relay team composed of H. Carter, O. Carter, L. Graves, and P. Davies, won fourth place in the relay.

The outstanding players on the basketball team thi. year have been Odell Carter, and Harold Carter, who was chosen on one or more All-Tourney teams. Three members of this year's team will be lost thru graduation, Odell Carter, Captain, Harold Lee Carter, and John Bradley.
