## HIGHLIGHTS OF THE WORK OF THE CHRONICLE STAFF

The work of the Chronicle Staff has been a success this year; We have been made to feel that we can truth. fully make this statement since we have been complimented by our own Superintendent of Schools, members of the State Department of Education, the President and others at Lincoln University, a Professor at a white University, many other school people in and out of the state, our own schoolmates, some of dur teachers, and by our parents. We are happy because we have been able to please our readers as we tried earnestly to carry out the aims of our school publications. These aims were stated in the first issue of the Chronicle in Principal Drew's "Foreword".

We shall mention here some of the accomplishments of the Staff this year. We have published the Lincoln Chronicle regularly each month. A copy of each issue has been sent to each home represented in the school, to the Pastor of each of the five Negro churches in the city, to the Superintendent of Schools, to each member of the Board of Education, to each teacher in our school, and to the schools on our "Exchange File". Each copy of the Chronicle this year averaged 12 pages with the proper percentage, as nearly as possible, of news, entertainment, sports, features, editorials, and other creative writings,

One of the outstanding features of the Lincoln Chronicle this year has been the column called "Student Opinion". In this column students have expressed themselves freely as to the needs of Lincoln School as they see it, and already, we have seen that the column has done something for the school. Some of the needs have been supplied and we have the promise of having all of them supplied as funds permit.

We present this Year Book as a summary of the Staff's work this year. We are deeply grateful to all the business men and women of Moberly and neighboring towns who have helped to make this book possible by giving us advertisements which you will read in this Annual.

We are greatly indebted to Mrs. Mery Ella Tymony, our adviser and teacher of the class in School Publications, for the lessons taught us which enabled us to go about our work with confidence, and for her untiring efforts in supervising the work of the Staff in every particular. You would be surprised to know how many long, hard hours beyond the call of duty she has spent in helping us to make the work of this department a success. The Staff has enjoyed a fine year because she has put in extra hours and extra effort which we greatly appreciate.

## HISTORY OF THE CLASS OF 1948

At the beginning of the next school year when we were called the Sophomore class, our number had dropped to twelve(12). Our classmates who returned to school in 1945 were: Frances Alderson, Evelyn Arthur, Rice Burton, Joseph Burton, Hardy Foxx, Viola Garth, Leroy Graves, Shirley Herald, William Reynolds, Donald Smith, Forrest Smith, Jr., Wanda Swyningan, Henry Vaughn, and Thomas West, Jr. Raymond Benton, a Sea-Bee, who had returned from the Navy, joined our class this year.

While three of our classmates, Frances Alderson, Raymond Benton, and Marie Garth, failed to return to school our Junior year, we had non-resident students to increase our number, namely: Rondle Grant, Betty Palmer, Barbara Simms, and Johnny Lampkins from Macon; Dorothea Nadine Rucker, Aubrey Lee Smith, and Marion Wilson from Huntsville, Mo., and Sandy Smith from St. Louis, Mo.

It was in this our Junior year that we began to take an active part in all school activities. Donald Smith, our class president for three years, starred in all the plays presented by the Speech class, and Dorothea Rucker played leading roles. Both of them participated in the first Oratotical contest also. Dorothea Rucker was co-captain of the girls' basketball team and Wanda Swyningan was a member of the team. Hardy Foxx, Jr., was co-captain of the boys' basketball team and Donald Smith, Forrest Smith, Thomas West., Aubrey Lee Smith, Marion Wilson, Billy Reynolds, and Leroy Graves were members of the team.

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Three of our members entered the District Golden Gloves Tournament which was held here in Moberly. They were Leroy Graves, who won the 147 pound Novice championship; Rice L. Burton and Ronald Grant.

Dorothea Rucker represented the class in the "Miss Lincoln" contest and came out with third place, The class repeated its assembly program play, "Dates Incorporated", at Macon, Mo., as a queen-contest benefit for our contestant.

One of our greatest social accomplishments during our Junior year was the sponsoring of the Junior-Senior Prom in the spring of 1947. We gave the first Prom that Lincoln has had.

At the beginning of this school year when we enrolled as the Senior Class of Lincoln High School, the sixteen names registered were these:- Evelyn Arthur, Hardy Foxx, Jr., Leroy Graves, William Reynolds, Henry Vaughn, Thomas "est, Jr., Rondle Grant, Johnny Lampkins, Betty Palmer, Barbara Simms, Dorothea Rucker, Donald Smith, Forrest Smith, Jr., Wanda Swyningan, Shirley Herald, and Lubrey Lee Smith. At the end of the first semester, however, Leroy Graves' name was dropped.

The activities begun by us in previous years were continued in our senior year. Hardy Foxx, Jr., and Forrest Smith, Jr., became co-captains of the Lincoln basketball Tigers. Donald Smith, who was Sports Editor of our school newspaper, the "Lincoln Chronicle", became the Editor-in-Chief this year. He also continued his fine acting in the plays presented by the Dramatics class. Wanda Swyningan has been one of the school's best soloists during the past four years. Henry Vaughn and Forrest Smith's trumpet playing will be long remembered. Henry Vaughn's work as Staff Artist of the school newspaper has won for him and for his class state wide recognition.

Outstanding students in scholarship during our high school career have been: Donald Smith, Henry Vaughn, Thomas West, Jr., Betty Palmer, Dorothea Rucker, Shirley Herald, Wanda Swyningan, and Barbara Simms. After May 21st, however, all the members of the class of 1948 will have their names transferred to the roll of the Lincoln High School Alumni.

To the two girls whose appetites are the greatest, Shirley Herald and Evelyn Arthur will their special privilege of going to the store before school in the morning and at noon for their mid-morning and mid-afternoon lunches.

To the girl in the class whose purse in the class will back her, Betty Palmer gives the permission to be called the best dressed senior girl, since she is passing out of the picture here at Lincoln.

#### VOCATIONAL HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT

It has become increasingly important to teach pupils that genuine homemaking is much more than housekeeping, so the arrangement of units demanded close attention.

The classes are based chiefly on four phases:

- 1. Food
- 2. Shelter
- 3. Clothing
- 4. Personal development

Units have been arranged so as to develop standards of living and appreciation of the value of personal and social development in the high school girl.

They know that in addition to keeping house, homemaking requires provision for the cultural, intellectual, and spiritual well-being of the household. They have learned that it is a business, a science, and an art.

The scope of the units have included:

- 1. Economy and Thrift
- 2. Family Relationships and Leisure
- 3. Clothing
- 4. Foods, Nutrition, and Basic Recipes
- 5. Personal Development

The girls have had various occasions to use their skill through preparation and serving meals for visiting basketball teams. The clothing skills were used in the construction and renovation of garments, and through the construction of drapes for the department.

The main objective has been to present the various phases as a unified whole and not as separate and isolated units of work.

The general objectives for the course in School Publications are: To provide practical applications of the principles of 1. grammar, punctuation, and spelling. To develop skill in collecting, condensing, and 2. organizing material in an interesting way. To provide an incentive for creative writing. 3. To develop confidence and poise in selling 4. advertising and gathering news. To develop qualities of accuracy, initiative, 5. dependability, thoroughness, and honesty in newspaper work. To offer an opportunity to perform a needed service 6. for the school. To give pupils experience in assuming responsibility-7. financial and editorial- for a newspaper that meets the needs of the school. To give a broad view of newspapers and magazines- the 8. ethics, history, and technicalities of their production. To help pupils to become discriminating and 9. appreciative readers of modern periodicals. 10. To provide students with an opportunity to explore the vocational possibilities of the field of journalism. 11. These objectives have been kept in mind by the teacher

in presenting the units on news writing, copyreading, feature stories and columns, editorial writing, advertising, study of periodicals, and the general survey unit.

Besides the regular lessons in theory and practice, the class in School Publications has published the school newspaper, THE LINCOLN CHRONICLE, each school month of this year; furnished an article for the local newspapers about each school activity during the year; sent an article to the Kandas City Kall, our Negro newspaper which so many read, each week; and has had the responsibility of editing this Year Book under the supervision of the Staff Advisers.

### Headlines Friday, Dec. 19, 1947 Lincoln Principal **Tells PTA How** Parents Can Help

"Why should every parent and every adult citizen of the com-munity be a member of the P. T. A.?" and "What can the parents A. ? and "what can the parents do to help?" were questions asked and answered by H. L. Drew, principal of Lincoln School, in a talk to the school's P. T. A. Monday night.

P. T. A. Monday night. Three points made in answer-ing the first question were: "You should belong to the P. T. A. be-cause it is an organization that has child welfare as its chief aim; because of its philosophy; and because of its objects."

In answering the second ques-tion, Principal Drew stated that the raising of money is not the chief concern of the P. T A, but it has more important concerns. it has more important concerns, such as helping the school to get every child of school age enrolevery child of school age enrol-led and then helping him to keep in regular daily attendance; sup-porting the school program of education; giving the child the right pre-school training in or-der that he will have the right attitude for the school training; by being interested in all that af-feets the child his home life his by being interested in an title his feets the child, his home life, his church life and his community relationships; and by finding out what the school needs and then seeing to it that those needs are supplied.

Mr. Drew stated that 'if teach-ers were asked specifically what they would like most for parents to do to help them in their work, the answers probably would be: Take more interest in the health of the child and the general care he gives his body; do not meas-ure the school of today by the the the school of today by the standards of a quarter of a cen-tury ago; and give more atten-tion to the general behavior of the child."

We have endeavored to organize our industrial arts work on the general shop plan, giving a variety of experiences to our students. Among the objectives we seek to achieve are the following:

- 1. To develop an active interest in industrial life.
- 2. To develop the appreciation of good workmanship and design.
- 3. To develop in each pupil an attitude of pride and interest in his ability to do useful things.
- 4. To develop the habit of an orderly method of procedure in asy task.
- 5. To develop the habit of self discipline which requires one to do a thing when it should be done, whether it is a pleasant task or not.
- 6. To develop an attitude od readiness to assist others when they need help and join in group undertakings.
- 7. To develop desirable habits with respect to health and safety.
- 8. To develop elementary skills in the use of the more common tools and a knowledge of the procedures in tasks frequently encountered by the average person.

At the beginning of the course some attention is given to general shop drawing, reading working drawings, etc. A major portion of the time was given to woodworking. Some work in cement was done. We was intended to do some work in metal, electricity, etc, but lack of equipment makes such courses impractical.

Several woodworking projects have been completed. Among them were footstools, end tables, book ends, coffe tables, book cases, etc.

The Senior girls took Industrial Arts this year and completed some very creditable projects, of which they are justly proud. The experiences they gained will be helpful to them when they become house wives.

HIGH SCHOOL SOCIAL STUDIES

The fact Matthis is a presidential election year has motivated a comparative study of some of the former candidates for the mesidency, administrations, etc., by the 15 members of the American History class. The Marchall Plan and other popular topics in current evenue have been the topic of much discussion also.

In all the social studies classes special days and weeks have been observed. Special attention was given this year to Negro History Week and to Carver Week. Whenever the least mention was made about the Negro in the textbooks, the teacher has elaborated the subject and had students make reports on many persons who have achieved greatness in the Negro race. ... part of the class regitations has been devoted to the study of state and national constitutions with particular a teation being given to the articles and amendements pertaining to the Negro. The history of the State of Missouri has been studied also in the American History class.

A class of 16 Sophomores has studied Sociology this wear with apparent interest. The central theme of the chase of Sociology studied by them, "Social Life and Personality", is the effect of social life on personality. The sever phases of social life studied by the class were: - family life, sommunity life, play life, education, work, ark, and religion. These units were followed by discussions of case studies which were supplied by the author of the text, the teacher, and the students. An attempt has been made to lead the students to become aware of the fact that they are members of society; that they have a share in making society potter; and that they have the responsibility of holding society solve its problems incelligently.

The Sonhomore class studied American Government the special sources of Students have been taught that if the prople take an interest in government, make a study of it and work at it, democracy will be preserved and perfected. A reasonable amount of each period has been devoted to the study of political news.

With the realization that citizenship training is the of the seven cardinal principles of education and one of the reasons why we have high schools, an effort has been made to make a lasting impression upon the minds of the pupils with the lessons taught in Citizenship of the values of the information. # SUMMER RECREATION

In 1947 for the first time in recent years a Summer Recreation program was in operation on the Lincoln School grounds for our girls and boys. The Lincoln playground was under the supervision of Mr. H. L. Drew, assisted by his wife who served without pay.

The playground was open on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday of Each week for a period of eight weeks. Morning sessions from 9 to 11:30 were for grade school children. Afternoon sessions from 1:30 to 4 p.m., were for high school students.

The games played depended on the interest of the various age groups. Sandboxes were constructed for the smaller children. Outdoor basketball, softball, dodge ball, touch football, paddle tennis, horshehoes, table tennis, aerial datts, chinese checkers, and various group games were sponsored.

The community Recreation program was brought to a climax with Field Day activities at the school on the last day of the program. Prizes of candy bars, chewing gum, peanuts, etc were given the winners in each of the events. These prizes were bought and paid for by Mr. and Mrs. Drew out of their personal funds. The Recreation Committee treated all present to Ice Cream bars.

The two outstanding accomplishments of the P.T.A., this year are the assistance given in the health clinics at the school and the continuation of the playground equipment : project. The unit paid the doctors for their services at the clinic and thereby relieved the parents of the obligat tion of paying for their children's immunizations and vaccinations. Members of the Unit also assisted the nurses at the clinic. A Merry-Go-Round was bought for the children at an approximate cost of \$100.06-

Regular monthly meetings have been held the third Monday. Much of the time in the October and November meetings was spent planning ways of getting more parents to attend the P.T.A. A special program and membership drive was the feature of the December meeting. Principal H. L. Drew was the speaker on the program. He discussed, "The Objectives of the P.T.A. and How Parents Can Help the School". At the social hour which followed, a plate lunch was served to all.

THE HOT LUNCH PROGRAM

We are pleased to report that our school lunch program has continued to function throughout this school year. The reduced rates in effect this year, plus the rapid rise in the cost of food, supplies, etc, have caused many schools to distontinue their hot lunch projects, but we have operated regularly since the second week of the school year. Of course, the program has not been self supporting, but we have financed it with funds raised in other school activities.

When the program was inaugurated in October 1945, the opening statement sent to parents read as follows: "We are making plans to begin a school hot-lunch program. We realize how important a complete school lunch is to the health of children. The right kind of food well prepared and enough of it make for stronger, finer bodies. As a school we are interested in the whole child. The school lunch program is not just a feeding program. It is a part of an over-all program to help children grow better in mind, body, and spirit. It is a vital part of school living and from it children and all who work in it will learn many things."

After three years of operation we are more convinced that the school lunch program is important and should be continued.

We serve a Type A lunch which always contains the following mimimum requirements:

1. One-half pint of whole milk as a beverage.

- Two ounces of lean meat, poultry, fish, or eheese, or one egg, or one half cup of dry beans, peas, or four tablespoons of peanut butter.
  Three-fourths cup of vegetables or fruit or both.
- 4. One or more portions of bread or muffins or
- other hot bread made of whole-grain or enriched fhour or cereal.
- 5. Two teaspoons of butter or fortified margarine.

Our lunches always meet these minimum requirements and usually we furnish more than is required. For meats we serve chicken, fish, turkey, beef, pork, etc. Different vegetables and fruits are served each day.

Mrs. H. L. Drew has had the general supervision of the lunch program and Mrs. Claud Estill has prepared the meals this year. (Her picture appears on another page).

### DEDICATED TO THE CLASS OF 1947

The Class of 1947 has its history recorded in the Year Book of that year which was as complete as it could be at the time the pook was published. This class did some things, however, after the date of publication while they were still students in Lincoln High School, which we think are worthy of being recorded here as a continuation of the History of the class of 1947 as it appears in the Annual of last year.

At the busiest time of the year when activities were the most numerous and when many in the school said that the expense attached was too great for the program to be a success financially, the Class of 1947 presented the Lincoln University Band, Jefferson City, Mo., in a concert here on May 13th of last year. Although the tickets sold for a socalled high price, the auditorium was filled and the school received \$108,24 profit from the program after the \$102.00 transportation cost had been paid. There was no contest on at the time, so the program and parade by the Band through the city was for the appreciation of the culture and inspiration which the students and the community at large might get from the appearnace.

The Class of 1947 did something else which showed their love for the school and the man who stands at the head of it. In one of these, no doubt, they set the example which other classes may follow. If they do, it is hoped that the giving will be prompted by the same motive and not from a sense of duty. At their Class Day exercises the Class of 1947 presented the school a large banner done in the school colors, blue and gold, on a standard which is about eight feet from the base. It has these words on it, "LINCOLN HIGH SCHOOL, MOBERLY, MO.". They also presented the school a metal money box which can be used by the doorkeepers at concerts, basketball games, etc. It has divided compartments so that change can be made easily. Then too, the Class of 1947 presented Mr. Drew, the Principal, a swivel désk chair as hiw own personal property. The class also remembered the Principal on his birthday and at Christmas with nice gifts, because their sponsor had emphasized the value of showing appreciation to persons who are worthy of it, even in a tangible way.

Some one has said that a good test of the worth of a high school is the number of its graduates who attend college, If this be true, then the Class of 1947 has done much to maise the standard of Lincoln High School. Seven of the nineteen members of the class are attending school again this year; four at Lincoln University, Jefferson City, Mo., two at Cucher Business College, St. Louis, Mo., and one at the School of Beauty Culture, St. Joseph, Mc.

Two members of the class are married and have begun their duties as house wives. All of the other members of the class are working either part cime or segularly.

#### FAITHFUL SERVICE

CHARLES H. BARTLETT

Charles H. Bartlett, Custodian of Lincoln School, began his duties here in September 1927, twenty years ago. During this long period of service he has proved himself to be a real asset to the school. He is a competent worker, faithful in the performance of his duties, a christian gentleman, and is filled with the school spirit. His place in the school is important, and he has dignified the position by the masterful way in which he performs his duties and with his exemplary attitude and character and his pleasing personality.

Nr. Bartlett recalls that at the time he began his work at Lincoln the building had only eight rooms, two corridors, and there was no playground on the north side of the building as at present.

The building program at Lincoln has expanded during the past twenty years until at this time Mr. Bartlett, who is still without an assistant, attempts to care for a school building which has ten classrooms; a large library-study hall; a gymnasium-auditorium; two lavatories; a kitchen, where hot lunches are prepared; two shower rooms; four long corridors; north and south stairways; and a principal's office. There is playground space on all sides of the building which has some equipment which requires some of his time. There are sidewalks on the sides of the school grounds facing Franklin and Horner streets which mean more work for him, especially in the winter after a snow. But he goes about all these duties with never a word of complaint, even though it is apparent that he needs help. Though the school has a very full activity program with frequent activities at night, he responds whenever called upon willingly and cheerfully.

Besides being almost indispensable at Lincoln School, Mr. Bartlett is a Deacon in the Second Baptist Church, Treasurer of the Church, and has been Superintendent of the Sunday School for more than 20 years. He is treasurer of the Lincoln P.T.A., and holds other offices which attest to his honesty and integrity.

Mr. Bartlett was born about three miles east of Moberly, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ellis Bartlett, now deceased. His mother, the former Miss Betty Lang, was a school teacher. He has a wife and a daughter, Mrs. Marian O. Morrison, Des Moines, Iowa. The daughter began her work at Lincoln the year her father began his work as custodian. She graduated from Lincoln High with highest honors in 1932, then received her Bachelor's degree from the University of Illinois in 1936 from the School of Music, end became a teacher at her alma mater, Lincoln School, in the fall of the same year. This position she held until her marriage in 1944.

During Mr. Bartlett's 20 years of service at Lincoln school he has been absent only 14 days. Ten of those days he was sick, one day he attended his step-daughter's funeral, and he was absent three days this year when his brother passed. That is a remarkable record.

Mr. Bartlett owns his home, a 5 room modern cottage at 713 S. 6th St.

Naturally, Lincoln has great admiration for him and for his faithful and untiring service. We believe he deserves this entire page that is being dedicated to him.
